It is hard to believe that we are nearing the end of the 2022-23 school year. We have much to celebrate! This year we learned about and began implementing Purposeful Play at Mease. We are using play to learn more about how to share, collaborate with our friends, and understand emotions in ourselves and others. We will continue to focus on this work next year.

We are celebrating our elementary winter assessment data. We had a high number of students

scoring at the proficient level and overall student growth was tremendous. Mease students were 85% proficient in literacy and 83% proficient in math. We are in the second year of a new literacy curriculum and next year we will have a new math curriculum. The teachers work hard to give students exactly what they need and students are making great progress!

It has been fun to watch the preschool and kindergarten students grow throughout the year. We continue to celebrate positive behaviors. I regularly see students in my office to celebrate making responsible choices or for helping others. It is fun to celebrate with special activities like "Pizza with the Principal" and other school wide celebrations. We are proud of all of our students.

Next year we will continue to stay focused. Soon we will be developing elementary level goals that tie to district goals. We don't need to add new and different things to meet our goals. We do want to continue to learn more about effective instructional practices that meet the needs of our students. We will align professional development to our goals.

Hello Wildcat Families! Once again, I hope this message finds you well and warm. As I write this the weather took a cold turn and is just above freezing for the day's high. Hopefully, this is the final cold spell before warmer spring temperatures settle in.

The winter activity and athletic season have given way to the spring season. Hard to believe that prom is only a few short weeks away. Spring is always an interesting transition time for schools. We are still running full steam in the current school year,

but preparing for the upcoming school year starting in August. Part of the preparations include academic planning for the next school year.

Very soon 9th, 10th and 11th grade students will be registering for courses for the 23-24 academic year. In order to graduate from Humboldt High School, students need 8 credits in English, 6 in mathematics, 6 in science, 6 in social studies, 18 elective courses, and take a PE course for each semester enrolled in the high school. Consequently, students will have a required set of core classes in math, science, social studies and English. Along with this core set of courses, students will have a number of elective courses to choose from. Currently, School Board policy indicates that all students need to be enrolled in seven classes each semester.

Ultimately, students need 48 total credits to graduate from Humboldt High School. If students pass all of their classes in a timely manner, they can graduate with more credits than the required total. However, we do face a challenge each year when scheduling courses at the high school. It becomes difficult to provide enough elective courses for 9th and 10th grade students to take prerequisite course work, while ensuring that all junior and senior students achieve a full course load. We are currently looking at ways to provide elective courses to 9th and 10th grade students, while providing some flexibility for 11th and 12th grade students to engage in both credit bearing and non-credit bearing workplace experiences.

Stay tuned as we continue to improve the course enrollment and scheduling process. As always, I appreciate your patience and support. Go Cats

We at Twin Rivers have things going on as we march into spring. Each year about this time we try to evaluate what is going well at TR and what are some areas we want to improve upon. We have started gathering feedback through our school culture survey and will continue to get suggestions when our SIAC (School Improvement Advisory Committee) meets in April. After the information is gathered we put together an implementation plan. This plan includes many of the suggested ideas. Some of the ideas may not be

included for a variety of reasons. Some ideas become long term goals in which we take progressive steps to accomplish the goal. The students have recently enjoyed having a STAR LAB in our gymnasium to support units in our science curriculum. We will call our program Skate for Heart and students will participate in roller skating during our American Heart Challenge. At the end of my first year, I reflected with Mr. Murray about how the year had gone and the "next steps" to help improve Humboldt Community Schools. One goal that we've had since I started is to provide a succinct and predictable outcome for struggling students. That goal has many variables and potential setbacks, but it is necessary to fulfill our mission of "Learning and Success for all."

This succinct and predictable outcome for students is accomplished through an effective Multi-Tiered Systems of Support, MTSS process. It is still challenging for staff to come to a consensus on how best to serve all of our students. An essential component of the process is documentation. We document the struggles the students are experiencing and the interventions staff implemented. Our MTSS process is improving. Staff members are still learning about and developing ways to monitor student progress to measure the impact of the interventions for guiding decisions about the next steps. At Humboldt Middle School, we are exploring adding literacy and math intervention classes for struggling students. We are beginning to develop a system for recording student interventions and progress monitoring data. We can use this system to communicate more efficiently and effectively as students transition through our school district.
