As we near the end of our first quarter, Humboldt High School has much to celebrate. Our students, staff, families, and community's vibrant Wildcat spirit was on full display during Homecoming Week. On Monday, October 21, we will schedule grade-level team conferences to support students and families. 

intervention groups targeting instruction to focus on the skills that each student needs to help them make growth no matter where they start. Our interventions range from reteaching early literacy and math skills to book clubs, to a school newsletter, to extension opportunities, and many things in between!

Recently, some of our 8th graders visited Iowa Central Community College to learn about post-secondary opportunities, career choices, and hands-on activities, which they will use to develop their 4-year plans for the high school courses they want to take to reach their post-secondary goals. Those students who didn't go this fall will attend in the spring.

I had the privilege of taking eight students to a Leadership Retreat at Lake Cornelia in Clarion a few weeks ago. Humboldt joined eight other conference schools to listen and learn from speaker Craig Hillier. He talked about the 5 Ps: People (work with and lead others), Passion (for whatever is in front of you), Perspective (how you view things around you), Process (the way you go about things), and Principles (your beliefs and morals). The feedback from students was very positive, and they wanted to implement some of the ideas they had learned in middle school. A few takeaways that students stated they would use in their future include:

- "You don't always have to be a loud, vocal leader; leaders also need to listen and take in other's points of view,"
- "Your body language, focus, and self-talk can have a major impact on how you lead"
- "The power of 'Yes, And' which adds to ideas and brings others into discussions, rather than shutting down ideas and excluding people"
- "The pizza was delicious" (spoken like a true middle school student!)
- The goal is to share our learning with others to bring a positive impact to our building.

Lastly, I am looking forward to Parent/Teacher conferences coming up on October 21 & 24. It is great to have parents in our building so they can see the growth their students are making in just a short amount of time.

Hello, Wildcat families! We had a tremendous Homecoming week at the elementary schools at the beginning of October. Our newly formed student leadership team, comprised of several fourth graders in our building, decided upon our dress-up days for the week, which had great student participation! These leaders also

helped to facilitate a community tour with Mr. Murray on October 15th; they have had a positive impact on our school so far! Our Homecoming week culminated in the parade Thursday evening and a high school student-led pep rally at Taft Friday morning. We are so grateful to have outstanding high school leaders to look up to from the elementary level!

Like many districts and buildings across the state, we've been navigating some changes in state laws as our year has begun. The first has been centered around student attendance. Laws were passed to target student absenteeism and truancy, but we received minimal guidance on carrying these laws out. We're fortunate to have great teamwork in our district, so our buildings have been able to ask questions and solve challenges collaboratively together to create cohesion in expectations for our students and families. The second state law we've been navigating has centered around reading plans for K-6 students who aren't proficient on our screening assessments. Our team has been hard at work after receiving answers to a few key questions we had. Students who haven't met assessment benchmarks for two screening periods in a row must have a detailed plan entered into Panorama, the state student achievement database. These plans need to be updated and shared with parents over the course of the year. Our teachers will be prepared to share interventions that have already been implemented and student progress at conferences in the coming week. These are coming up on October 21st and 24th. We look forward to continuing our strong partnerships with families to continue to meet student needs together!

Many things are going well at Humboldt Middle School. We have finished selecting student leaders to help lead our school body in various ways, including students who will be ambassadors, help navigate our school climate, and make decisions that impact our school decisions.
